

### My Tiger Jungle Adventure

**Adventure Goal:** A Tiger's world includes many types of animals, plants, and insects. Scouts learn that these living things all have a purpose and we need to share our environment with them. Scouts will notice the habitats of various creatures and learn that everyone can make a positive difference in the world around them.

#### Adventure Requirements:

Complete Requirement 1 plus at least two others.

The highlighted sections will be covered in the video you can view.

1. With your parent, guardian, or other caring adult, go for a walk outside, and pick out two or more sights or sounds of "nature" around you. Discuss with your partner or den. Complete 1 Foot Hike Worksheet.
2. Take a 1-foot hike. Make a list of the living things you find on your 1-foot hike. Discuss these plants or animals with your parent/guardian, other caring adult, or your den. Complete 1Foot Hike Worksheet.
3. Point out two different kinds of birds that live in your area. With your parent/guardian, other caring adult, or den, find out more about one of these birds.
4. Be helpful to nature by planting a plant, shrub, or tree. Learn more about the needs and growth of the item you've planted.
5. Build and hang a birdhouse.

#### Adventure #1 and #2 1 Foot Hike Activity Supply List:

-Paper or 1 Foot Hike Worksheet

-Pencil

-1-2 foot piece of string or cord tied in a loop (circle)

-Magnifying glass (optional)

1. Go on a walk/hike in a park, by a pond, at the beach, or in your own backyard. When you find an area your Scout wants to investigate lay out your string to form a circle. Give your Scout 5-10 minutes to examine their area. Have them look under rocks, in a log, under a potted plant. An area of dirt with sparse plants is better than a manicured yard. A magnifying glass will encourage them to look closely for tiny movements of small bugs or insects.
2. Asking scouts to listen and share the names of birds they know before going on your hike to help get them thinking. A local park with trees and water is often your best bet for observing birds. Common birds might be robin, duck, goose, chickadee, blackbird, dove, hawk, pigeon, or seagull.

#### **Adventure #5 Bird House Activity Supply List:**

-Piece of string from 1 Foot Hike

-Sissors

-Paint

-Plastic milk carton, pieces of wood, paper juice carton

A birdhouse can be made from a milk carton, large food can, or pieces of wood. Look at the pictures below, make a plan and build your birdhouse according to your plan.

1. Listen to the sounds of nature to help get a feel for how wild or urban your environment is.
2. Look at the pictures below, make a plan and build your birdhouse according to your plan.
3. Use string and hang it in your yard.
